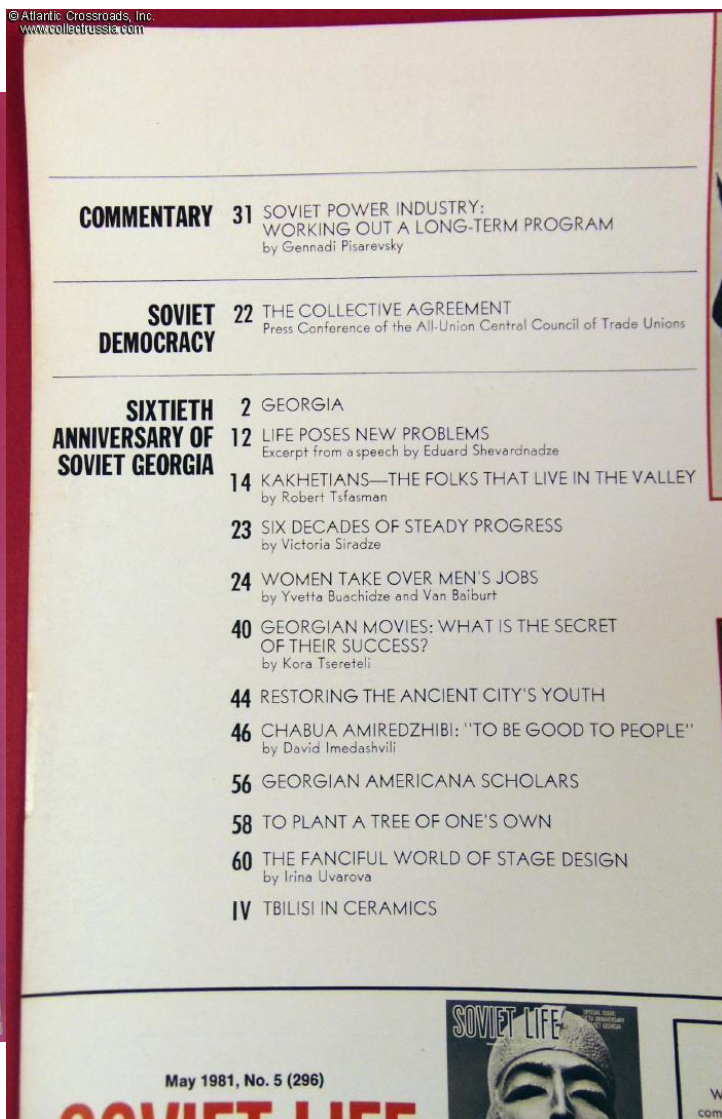
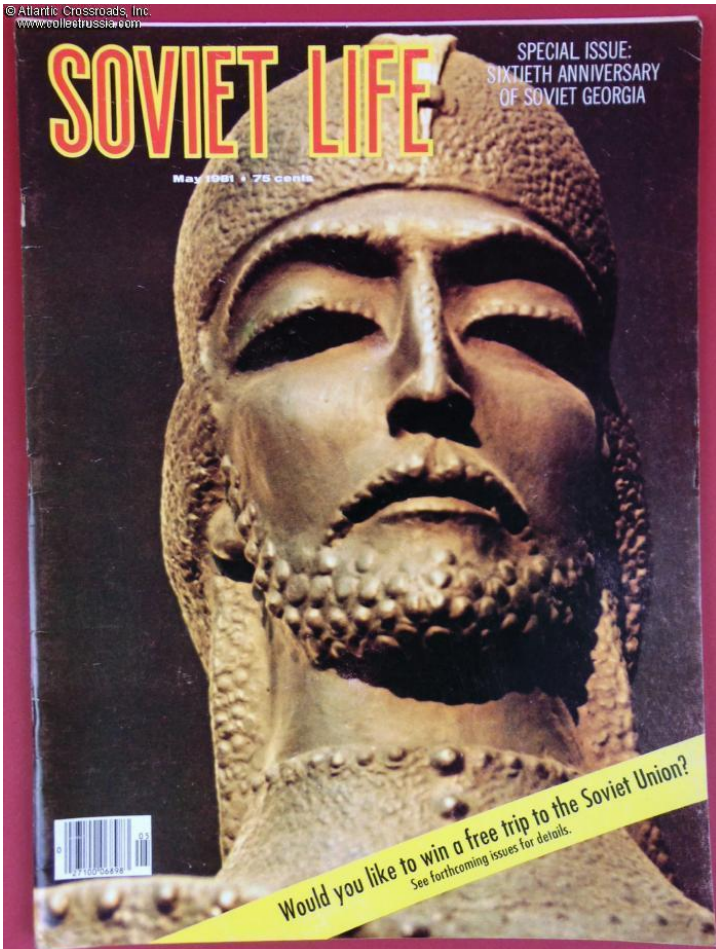
Almost the entire issue is dedicated to covering the life, work and leisure, industry and culture of the people of Soviet republic of Georgia.

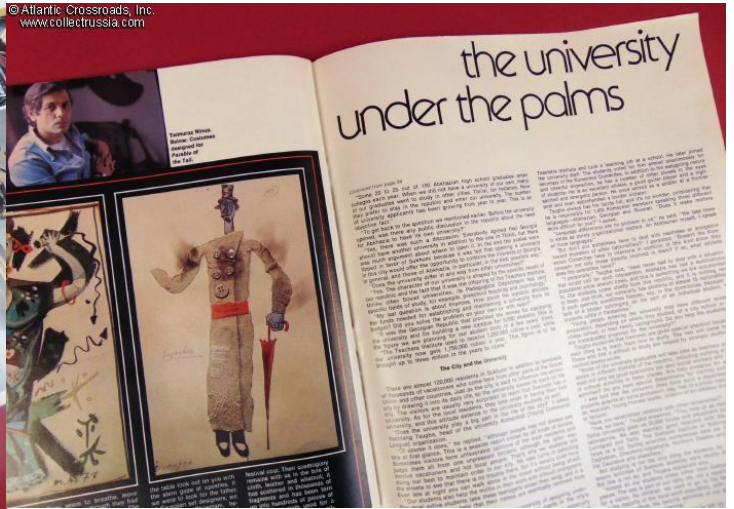
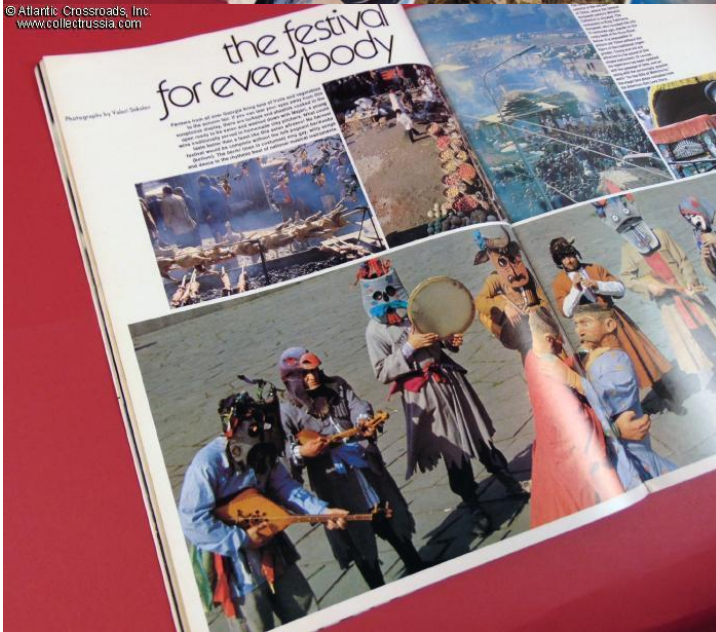
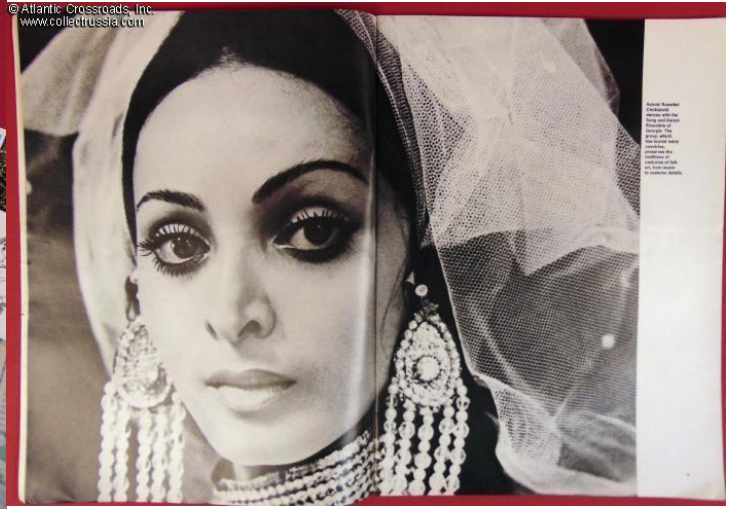




Old Tbilisi



Tbilisi in ceramics

Artist Ivan Dolida was born in 1947 and spent his childhood in old Tbilisi, with its narrow streets, crowded courtyards and small houses with their traditional carved wooden balconies and spiral staircases. Twenty years later he began to depict all this on his ceramic panels, lovingly conveying the atmosphere of the past. His works depict the world of old Tbilisi (Georgian taverns, phantoms, vendors, knife-grinders and organ-grinders). After finishing eight grades of school, Dolida entered a special school at a ceramics factory where he learned the secrets of one of the oldest crafts: how to produce Georgia's famous black ceramics. He liked the work very much, but his thirst for knowledge and his love of art led him to the Art Academy in Tbilisi, where he learned to work in any media, including glass and metal.
